

This was evident through our SheCan program, the engagement through our digital conference and, later in the season, community collaborative conversations. These conversations will continue as we look to our sport as a tool for positive social change and seek to ensure our diversity is celebrated and included as we continue to build and grow one team. The coming year will be critical to the implementation of our strategic goals. Now is our time to look forward to working together with our whole community to grow the exciting vision for our sport.





COMMITTEE UPDATE

Field Hockey Canada is committed to developing competent coaches that are NCCP trained and certified to support our domestic programs and athlete development. In order to support this, The Coach Education Committee met regularly to discuss and action initiatives to progress coach education across the country. With Covid still impacting the sport world, we were able to continue our focus with our courses in an online/digital format (exception would be coach evaluations on site).

Master Coach Developers (MCD)

• 5 MCD's trained to deliver FHC's Comp Dev Coach Evaluator workshop

Community Coach

- This course has numerous participants across the country, including BC, Ontario and Alberta.
- FIH has recognized this education module with equivalent FIH Level 1 Certification.

Competition Development Coach

- FHC is collaborating with FIH to use the FIH Level 3 course and one stand-alone course to meet the field hockey specific requirements for Comp Dev
- There will be an announcement with full details in the fall

Competition Introduction Coach

- The coach education committee, updated, modernized and re-formatted this sport specific course for delivery online.
- New Learning Facilitators have been trained for this course level in Alberta. Ontario and BC.
- Final approval from CAC for the course is pending.
- LF's and CE's can be trained in this context in all regions by our MCD's
- The Guide to Coach Education for FHC has been completed.

COMMITTEE UPDATE

The committee has updated the following the Community, Provincial, Regional and Umpire Assessor courses. The committee is also providing a train-the-educator for all umpire educators to ensure courses are delivered consistently nationwide.

FHC has also updated the assessment forms and these will be implemented alongside the new courses to reflect the updated learning standards. The committee has created documents to support development of Technical Officials.

A sub-committee of active international technical officials was created in 2020/21 and the group created learning objectives to guide the development of Judge, Technical Officials and Technical Delegates courses. These learning goals were used to create evaluations for Technical Officials and Judges that were used at various events in 2021/22. These evaluations will help the FHC Officials Committee determine ongoing education needs and create a list of high performance TOs suitable for recommendations for international events.

CALGARY CANADA DAY MASTERS FESTIVAL

Our most sincere thanks to leadership of Field Hockey Alberta for stepping forward to host an initial Canada Day Masters event. This was proposed in early January and slowly progressed from there. The event comprised (6) 7-a-side teams, 3 men's and 3 women's and played over 3 days, Friday-to-Sunday.







Our over-50 and over-60 Men's Masters teams had the opportunity to test their skills against an English Masters team on a 12-day tour to Western Canada. This was a very skilled side with several players from past World Cups and gave our teams the opportunity to test their abilities prior





to the Cape Town and Tokyo tournaments. Whilst our over-60's lost both games to the visitors, our over-50's lost 1 and then won their 2nd game, so positive experiences for both teams.





WORLD CUP UPDATES AND PLANNING

Together with many other international competitive sport events, FIH Masters 2020 World Cup tournaments, re-scheduled to 2021, were again

compromised and then re-scheduled to 2022 due to the Covid-19 Coronavirus pandemic. Regrettably, the 2022 Masters Indoor World Cup was scheduled. World Masters Hockey have recently announced the 2023 Pan Am Continental Cup will be held in Argentina from December 6-17. World Masters Hockey have also confirmed that the planned 2022 Masters World Cups will take place as previously scheduled. With a new Technical Committee in place, appointment of qualified umpires for all event requests are now part of the Tech. Committee responsibilities. With Master events becoming more popular, this will be an important step forward. Requests are usually for 1 umpire per 2-team participation.

The 2022 Field Hockey Canada Conference wasa three-day online event held from May 3-May 5, 2022. The second edition of this conference aimed to engage and inspire while relying on True Sport values, such as respect, fairness and inclusion.

Featuring various experts and speakers from diverse professional backgrounds, the event encapsulated all aspects of the industry in a way that gave back to the community and celebrates the strength of our numbers.

Over 100 participants over the three days enjoyed six educational sessions on topics such as consussion education, community inclusion, physical and mental health and more. Field Hockey raised almost \$500 in donations to support the event and put toward future programming. MEMBERSHIP ENGAGEMENT



F-RED

Field Hockey Canada's Registration and Engagement Database, known as F-RED, has now been in use for a full year. This database has enabled over 1,000 players, coaches and officials, to register for all National programming at the Senior, NextGen and TAP levels. The system also played a major role in the collection and storage of player roster information, waivers, and membership confirmation for our U18 and U16 National Championships, this past summer. It further allowed us to collect and confirm safe sport criteria for participating coaches and officials.

With the start of the new membership season, FHBC and FHA participants, have already begun successfully registering in the system. As we continue to build the database, we will be able to create an all-inclusive hub that accounts for all participants across Canada. This will allow Field Hockey Canada and its member PSOs the ability to effectively maintain member data and easily report on our membership numbers, to govern more efficiently.

FUNDRAISING

Over the past year, Field Hockey Canada has used the Canada Helps Donation platform to host 11 fundraising campaigns across 6 teams, raising a total of \$386,070.10. We now have a donor database of over 2,000 who have contributed once or multiple times throughout the season.

Staple campaigns that have been ongoing and re-ignited prior to major competitions, include the Senior Adopt-a-Team and Junior Adopt-an-Athlete fundraisers. As a part of the fundraisers, givebacks to the community have been provided upon hitting major donation milestones of 10k, as well as thank you postcards and standardized email updates during competition periods.

Moving forward, Field Hockey Canada plans to elevate and further enhance the donor appreciation model, to develop a more sustainable means of connecting and thanking in the future. November will once again be dedicated to a Giving Tuesday campaign and this December; we aim to develop a Thank You campaign.





ACTION-PACKED YEAR CULIMINATES IN WORLD CUP PERFORMANCE

By winning the Junior Pan American Championship last year, the JWNT qualified for the Junior World Cup. They then traveled to South Africa only to have the tournament postponed due to the arrival of Omicron. The team was safely brought home and returned to Potchefstroom for the Junior World Cup. It was an incredible experience-building tournament that will set these athletes up to make the jump to senior hockey. The NextGen system ran ID camps during the late summer and will proceed to the 2023 qualifiers with a selected group moving forward.

WNT IS BACK ON THE INTERNATIONAL STAGE

The Women's National Team had an incredibly busy year. They first punched their ticket to the World Cup in January by placing third at the Pan American Cup in Santiago, Chile. They defeated USA in a thrilling Bronze Medal match to secure their spot. More on the World Cup on page 31. The team played in Terrassa at the World Cup before moving straight onto the UK for the Commonwealth Games in Birmingham. The team placed a tied-for-best fifth place at the Commonwealth Games, defeating Scotland 3-1 in the 5/6 match. They narrowly missed out on a spot in the semis, dropping a heartbreaker 1-0 to England during the pool-play matches. Over the last two cycles, Canada has established themselves as a semis threat at the Commonwealth Games.

The Women's National Team ran several successful fundraisers in conjunction with their attendance at the Pan American qualifier and the subsequent World Cup. The team raised over \$100,000 in the process.

It had been 28 years since the Canadian Women's National Team has participated in the FIH Hockey World Cup. The road to qualification went back the past several years as this team battled Olympic qualifiers and years of building to get to the 2021 Pan Am Cup qualifying tournament.

Canada faced an opening night challenge, taking on the hosts, Spain. After losing their first game, they dropped a last-minute heartbreaker to Korea, a game that would have sent Canada through to the pre-quarters. Their final pool play was to familiar foe Argentina. In the consolation rounds, Canada played to two 60-minute draws, both resulting in shootout losses. Despite going winless at their return to the World Cup, the Canadian Wolf Pack proved to the world that they are back in a big way.
