LETTER FROM CEO

Dear Field Hockey Canada Community,

It is with great pride and gratitude that I introduce this year's Annual Impact Report—marking the final year of our 2020–2025 Strategic Plan.

Over the past five years, we have come a long way. As we reflect on our progress against the key performance indicators set in 2020, there is much to celebrate. Field Hockey Canada has grown into a more stable, well-governed organization, recognized by the Government of Canada for making highly significant strides in system development.



This includes welcoming two new provincial members, building a clear pathway from youth to masters, launching accessible online coach and umpire education programs, and delivering over \$1,000,000 in direct funding to communities across the country to support grassroots growth.

Our domestic event landscape has expanded, most notably through the leadership of the U SPORTS Nationals, which has helped elevate the profile and reach of our sport. On the international stage, our national programs have achieved remarkable milestones: the Men's National Team competed at the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games, the Junior Women's National Team won a continental championship in 2021, and the Women's National Team returned to the World Cup for the first time in 28 years in 2022. Junior World Cup qualification has evolved during this strategic cycle from the previous sporadic qualification of a single gender, to a consistent standard, with both our junior men's and women's teams now qualifying for their third consecutive appearance.

These accomplishments are a testament to the dedication of our athletes, coaches, officials, volunteers, and staff across the country. I've enjoyed working with all of you over the years and am proud of the collective effort that has built a stronger, more inclusive sport system.

That said, we know there is still work to be done. We continue to face challenges in generating the discretionary revenue needed to support our senior national teams, in establishing well-governed, nationally standardized domestic leagues, and in growing participation across all levels. As we look to provincial members and other system partners to achieve these, we will double down on our efforts and leadership of these as we move into a new strategic cycle. Our ambition remains clear: to see our national teams consistently ranked among the world's top 10—and we are committed to supporting these young teams on that journey. The build and system transformation takes time but we are well on our way!

As we move forward, it's essential that we keep our eyes on the bigger picture. Our shared goal is to make the national "boat go faster"—to strengthen the sport for all Canadians. This requires unity, collaboration, and a commitment to the national interest.

Thank you for your continued support, passion, and belief in the future of field hockey in Canada. I invite you to explore this report and celebrate the progress we've made—together.

Field Hockey Canada Celebrates Activation of 60 Community Projects Across Canada

Field Hockey Canada is delighted to update our members on the activation of this year's Community Sport for All Initiative by celebrating the first milestone in its commitment to serving underserved communities across Canada. Through the continued support of the Government of Canada's Community Sport for All Initiative (CSAI), Field Hockey Canada has secured \$800,000 in funding over two years. The application process was launched nationwide. Field Hockey Canada is thrilled by the response from communities nationwide. This first disbursement of funding enabled the launch of 60 community-based field hockey projects across 10 provinces and one territory, reaching over 90 communities and serving almost 30,000 participants.

HALL OF FAME



Field Hockey Canada is proud to announce the induction of John De Souza into the Field Hockey Canada Hall of Fame, Class of 2024. Honoured in the Coach category, De Souza stands as the sole inductee this year, a fitting recognition for a career that has shaped the landscape of Canadian field hockey.

With a coaching career spanning over 30 years, De Souza's influence has been felt at every level of the game. A former national team player, he represented Canada at the 1995 Pan American Games and competed internationally for seven years. His transition to coaching was seamless and impactful. He led the Canadian men's national indoor team to a seventh-place finish at the 2007 Indoor World Cup in Vienna and served as assistant coach for the gold-medal-winning men's team at the 2007 Pan American Games, which secured a spot at the 2008 Beijing Olympics, with the Pan Am Gold. De Souza is known for his program building, generating buy in and leading with passion. He said that culture comes first and paves the way for success.



UNIVERSITY CHAMPIONSHIPS

Last fall, the U SPORTS Field Hockey Championship evolved into a Field Hockey Canada property delivered in partnership with hosts, York University, and U SPORTS. The final-four event took place at York University in Toronto, ON on October 31 – November 3, 2024. This event was the culmination of the regular season and determined the champion of university hockey in Canada, which was the University of Victoria.

This is an exciting new dawn for the women's field hockey pathway in Canada. Since the inception of university field hockey, universities have played a key role in hockey development. University athletes go on to be the sport builders, athletes, officials and supporters of the sport throughout their life.

In this move, Field Hockey Canada has embraced the opportunity for a partnership with U SPORTS and participating universities with the vision to build the national championship into a strong asset for our sport and strong value proposition for athletes graduating high school.

Field Hockey Canada has developed an initial three-year hosting plan to ensure clarity in the planning and stability. This has resulted in a first ever Maritimes hosting at UPEI in the fall of 2025, which will be followed by a West Coast hosting in 2026.

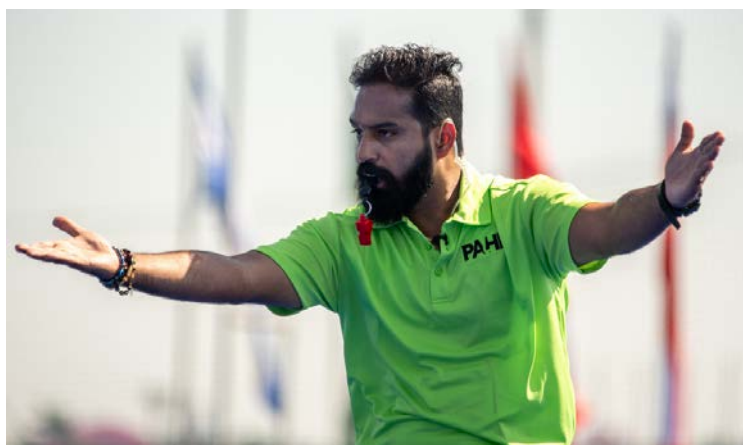

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SENIOR NATIONAL TEAMS



Canadian field hockey shone brightly on the global stage this year. Our national teams delivered inspiring performances, with youth tours generating excitement and senior squads advancing in World Cup qualification. A busy junior season showcased emerging talent, while we celebrated first-time caps and honored retiring athletes who've shaped our legacy. These milestones reflect our growing international presence and the depth of talent across our programs, reinforcing Canada's reputation as a competitive and passionate hockey nation.

NEXTGEN HOCKEY

The Field Hockey Canada NextGen Program is a talent assessment and development philosophy focused on identifying and nurturing the next generation of performance-development athletes through collaboration with the key stakeholders; athletes, parents, clubs, Provincial Sport Organizations and FHC. Designed for players approximately 4 to 8 years away from senior national team impact, the approach provides a pathway to help young players reach their goals within field hockey.

At its core, the NextGen Program is dedicated to long-term athlete support and development, to create a life-long affinity to the game and giving players the best opportunities to reach their goals.

NEXTGEN HOCKEY

National Training Centre Hubs:

All athletes selected for youth tours this year were identified through their participation in Daily Training Environments (DTEs), ensuring selections are grounded in consistent, high-quality training and performance monitoring. Over the past year, five National Training Centre DTEs have been in operation: BC Island, BC Mainland, Alberta, and Ontario. This season also marked the launch of the Maritimes program, which ran on a camp-based system to provide athletes in the region with regular, structured opportunities for development and assessment.

The NG Women's Program ran from September 2024- April 2025. Throughout the Fall, Winter and Spring months, athletes trained consistently with NextGen, participating in on-field or indoor sessions twice per week. In addition, they attended two Strength & Conditioning sessions each week to support athletic development. Complementing the physical training, a series of educational workshops were held throughout the year, covering key topics such as Mental Performance, Nutrition, and Recovery, ensuring a holistic approach to athlete growth both on and off the field, as well as building the pillars of high performance sport.

In addition, the NG Men's tour to Malaysia was selected from standout performances at the 2024 National Championships, highlighting the critical role domestic competition plays in the broader performance-development pathway. Together, these training and competition environments form the backbone of the selection process, preparing and identifying athletes with the skills, resilience, and readiness to represent Canada on the youth international stage.

System Change 2025-2026:

The NextGen Program is a performance development program that is part of a larger talent development system focused on identifying and nurturing the next generation of Canadian athletes.

Designed for players approximately 4 to 8 years away from senior national team impact, the program provides a structured pathway to help them reach their full potential.

NEXTGEN HOCKEY

Foundation for Canada's future success, feeding into Junior and Youth National Teams and ultimately preparing athletes to excel at the senior international level. The NextGen National Program brings together top athletes from across Canada, providing targeted training and meaningful competition designed to elevate their game and prepare them for the world stage.

FIELD HOCKEY CANADA HIGH PERFORMANCE VISION

By 2036 Men's National Team (MNT) and Women's National Team (WNT) consistently in the top 10

How is this achieved?

- In a long-term development pathway that is geared towards developing pillars of high performance. This includes skill and tactical development, strength & conditioning, mental performance, and nutrition. Providing opportunities for international exposure in the Talent Pathway (at Canada U16, U18, and U21 levels), so athletes are prepared to perform at the senior national team level on the global stage.

How is this measured?

- Senior National Teams consistently qualifying for the World Cup and Olympic Games by 2036
- U21: Two athletes per gender per year breaking into senior squads, ensuring competitive teams capable of medaling at Junior Pan-Am games and qualify for Junior World Cups.
- U18: Demonstrable progress in technical skills, decision making and physical capacity for high intensity international match, reflected in performance levels against peer nations and those currently ranked above.
- U16: athletes receiving consistent, frequent performance environment, including international opportunities at home or abroad.
- The NextGen program is vital to developing athletes across Canada through a pathway that is designed in collaboration with the Senior National team coaches and staff.

YOUTH TOURS

Youth tours are a key component of the NextGen programming each year, providing athletes with invaluable exposure to the pillars of high performance and the demands of international hockey. These tours offer the groups opportunities to gain international experience by competing against other youth teams, helping them develop both on and off the field.

Each country selects its youth age groups differently, but for us, it is crucial that the games present a competitive, stretch opportunity for our athletes. Youth tours also support players in gaining experience representing Canada, serving as an important stepping stone toward Junior Pan Am Games and Junior World Cups.

JUNIOR NATIONAL TEAMS

The Junior National Teams have had a busy year. Coming off an exciting home Junior Pan American Cup in 2024 in Surrey, BC, the teams were back on-field this season, with multiple competitions and camps. This season, the teams had a full camp and selection period where the top 30 male and female athletes gathered to be identified and prepare for the Junior Pan American Games. That was the marquee tournament of season as they look forward to the Junior World Cups in December.

JUNIOR PAN AMERICAN GAMES

Asuncion, Paraguay | August 9-19, 2025

Canada's junior women's and junior men's national teams headed to Asuncion, Paraguay, for the 2025 Junior Pan American Games. This marks a historic milestone for hockey and for Team Canada as field hockey makes its debut at the Junior Pan American Games, which ran from August 10 to 19 at the National Hockey Centre in Luque.

The Pan American Games are a multi-sport Games, recognized by the IOC and continental Olympic Organization. Both the junior men and junior women maintained their placement from last year's JPAC but improved on depth across the board. An exciting time for junior hockey in Canada.

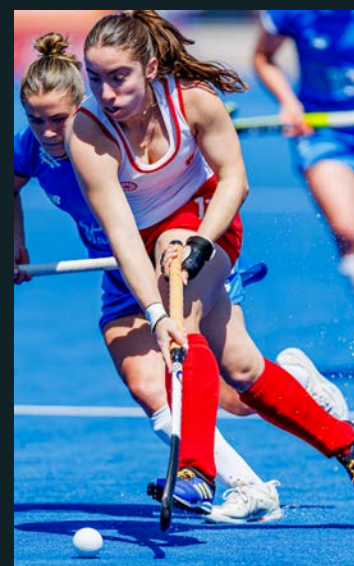
JUNE 26-28 (SURREY, BC)
