THE 1956 CANADIAN WOMEN'S GRASS HOCKEY TEAM

The historic 1956 Women's Hockey Team was the first team ever, women's or men's, to play for Canada at a World Tournament, the International Federation of Women's Hockey Associations' Conference and Tournament, held in Sydney, Australia.

The Greater Vancouver Women's Grass Hockey Association was an Associate Member of the International Federation, and had only 8 teams at that time, while England had 1,026 clubs! The Vancouver Association had to raise \$15,000 just for the airfare for the trip; in today's dollars that was \$160,000 to \$170,000! Fortunately, an unknown benefactor donated one-half of the total, so they only had to raise the equivalent of \$82,500!

The Team played in the World Tournament in Sydney, and toured and played in five of the six states, and in Canberra, in Australia's federal territory, for two months starting in May, 1956.

Sixty-five years after the team's ground-breaking participation in the Australian Tournament, Field Hockey Canada honoured the 1956 Team by choosing it for induction into its Hall of Fame in 2021.

The following summer, a celebration of the Team's induction was held in Vancouver. In attendance was a videographer/photographer who recorded the event, and produced the photo above.

Field Hockey Canada CEO Susan Ahrens was recorded as saying, "These really are the first inaugural group to build an international women's team and go offshore to represent Canada at home and abroad. To get us on the map was a really important part in our history."

Congratulations to the 1956 Canadian Women's National Team for being inducted into the Field Hockey Canada Hall of Fame!

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THE INTERNATIONAL FEDERATION

The IFWHA, (IF), was a unique organization of women field hockey enthusiasts whose inaugural conference and tournament was held in Geneva. From eight member countries, and eight teams, in 1930, the IF grew to a Conference of 35 countries and a Tournament of 22 teams in 1975, and 18 teams in 1979.

All member countries and associates were encouraged to send delegates and teams. All attendees, including official visitors, were welcome to participate in general meetings, and rules interpretation/umpiring sessions. Beginning in 1930, concert evenings, or “national nights,” with each team participating, became highly anticipated entertainment. Also popular, were the opening and closing ceremonies, with a parade of teams and flag-bearers, instituted in 1950.

The IF event was held over a period of close to two weeks. Each team, consisting of 15 players and a manager, played a minimum of six games. They “played the game for the game’s sake;” no play-offs were held, or winners announced. By the 1970’s, societal attitudes had changed, and the tournament began using a championship format in 1975.

The 1930 Conference was the first to include pre- and post-tournament tours and games. These took place, not only in the host country, but also in neighbouring countries. These became a very special part of the whole IF experience.

To work towards the uniformity of rules had always been one of the aims of the Federation; in 1980, the world’s joint (women’s and men’s) “Hockey Rules Board” came into being. The same year, women’s hockey was included in the Olympics! Alas, the integration of the women’s and men’s federations resulted in the dissolution of the IFWHA at the “IFWHA/FIH,” (hardly anyone included “IFWHA” in the name), Women’s World Cup in Malaysia in 1983.

THE CANADIAN WOMEN’S ASSOCIATIONS

Lower Mainland Women’s Grass Hockey Association

The LMWGHA was established in 1929. In 1936, the Association arranged for its “Vancouver All-Stars” Team to represent Canada in a game against the Australian National Team on its way to Philadelphia for the third IFWHA Tournament and Conference. That led to President Mary West being invited to become the first Canadian representative to attend an IF Conference and the first Canadian Official Visitor to an IF Tournament. The LMWGHA was responsible for having Canada accepted as an Associate Member of the IFWHA in 1937.

Greater Vancouver Women’s Grass Hockey Association

The GVWGHA was established in 1938. Under the Association name, Canada was represented at three IFWHA events: Florence Strachan was the Delegate in 1953 in Folkestone; the 1956 Team played in the Sydney Tournament; and the 1959 Team played in the Amsterdam Tournament.

Canadian Women’s Field Hockey Association

The CWFHA, (CW), was established in 1962. Being a Canadian Association allowed the CW to receive government funding, beginning with the Tournament in 1963. The CW continued to send Canadian delegates, umpires, teams, and managers in: 1967, 1971, 1975, and 1979. The CW and the 1979 Women’s International Tournament Society put on an outstanding and remarkable Championship Tournament, considered to be the “best” of the twelve IFWHA Tournaments and Conferences.

THE CANADIAN PIONEERS AND THE IFWHA

Mrs. Mary West Murray

As President of the LMWGHA, Mary West invited the Australian National Team to play a “Canadian” team on its way to the IFWHA Tournament and Conference, (T&C), in Philadelphia in 1936. She then became the first Canadian Representative and Official Visitor to that T&C. In 1937, applying on behalf of the LMWGHA, she received Associate Membership for Canada in the IFWHA. Mary was proud to call herself a Seventy-Niner, (79er), and maintained that she was the earliest-born of all the 79ers!

Mrs. Florence (Flossie) Strachan Petersen, BEd

Flossie Strachan attended the 1953 IFWHA T&C in Folkestone, England, as Canada’s first Delegate, representing the GVWGHA, (which had only six teams at that time). Flossie became Canada’s Corresponding Secretary and International Correspondent. She played on the 1956 Team, and was the 1959 Manager. She was very involved, as the President of the 79ers, and as a member of the Board of Directors of the 1979 Society, in helping to organize the IFWHA T&C at UBC in August, 1979.

Mrs. May Brown, BPE, MPE, OBC, OC

UBC Head Coach Brown’s initiative was the sole reason that Canada received its first invitation to attend an IFWHA T&C, (Australia in 1956). May had coached the top teams in the GVWGHA League. In 1950, she organized the first International Tournament to be held in Canada; there were 15 teams, most coming from the US, and over 200 participants, at the Pacific NW Conference. May had led the raising and standardizing of umpiring in BC. She was then well-suited to take on the responsibility for: the Team’s rules training, overseeing the (male) coaching, and for the final 1956 Team selection.

Mrs. Margaret (Marg) McLean

Marg was Vice-Captain of the 1956 team and goalie for the 1959 team. She was Canada’s first International Correspondent. Marg campaigned hard for the first Canadian Association, and in 1962, was elected to the first presidency of the CWFHA. She quickly applied for full membership in the IFWHA, which increased Canada’s Conference delegates to two from one. She fought for a sea-to-sea national team to play in the 1963 T&C, and found government funding to help make that happen. She was Canada’s proud Senior Delegate in Baltimore in 1963. Margaret McLean was appointed to the 1975 IFWHA Umpire’s Judging Committee, the highest position for an umpire at that time.

Ms. Dorothy (Dot) Asuma

Dot was the pre-tour manager for the first three Canadian teams to attend the World Tournaments. She was an Official Visitor in 1963, Team Manager in 1971, and 1975, and a Canadian Delegate in 1975. At the 1971 Auckland T&C, she accepted the IFWHA role of Hon. Tournament Secretary, and became the Organizing Committee Chair of the 1979 T&C at UBC. As such she reported to the 1975 Conference in Edinburgh, and to the Council in London in 1978. The final IFWHA Tournament was the best of the twelve! BCSHoF Curator Jason Beck wrote that 1979 “proved a remarkably successful tournament.”

Ms. Christine Grant, BPE, MPE, PhD

Christine Grant was Canada’s first female coach, the first to select her team, and the first to travel with her team, playing in the 1963 T&C in Towson, near Baltimore. She was a Canadian Delegate and Umpire in 1971, and a Selector for the 1975 Team, (and the American Team!). In 1978, she chaired the first ever Technical Committee for the National Tournament. Christine was the only representative of Canada on the 1979 IFWHA Tournament Management Committee. She was appointed as a Field Hockey Judge at the 1980 Olympic Games. At the final meeting of the IFWHA, in 1983, Christine’s name was proposed by the IFWHA, and she was elected to serve on the FIH Coaching Committee.

The above were all 79ers, except May, who supported the 79ers financially, but did not qualify for membership, as she had not attended an IFWHA Tournament. All but Mary and May are members of the Field Hockey Canada Hall of Fame. May is a member of the UBC, and the BC, Sports Halls of Fame. Christine is a member of seven other Halls of Fame, including the United States Field Hockey Hall of Fame.

NOTES FROM ABOVE:

IFWHA #6: The first team to represent Canada, women's, or men's, at a World Tournament. The host country required that the team have players from at least two different Associations.

IFWHA #7: The host country allowed all players on the team to come from the GVGWHA.

IFWHA #8: The first team to represent the new CWFHA. Two places were offered to each of ON and NS. However, ON declined to accept the two places.

FIGURES FROM ABOVE SHOW THE FOLLOWING:

1. WEST provided 80/105, or 76%, or more than $\frac{3}{4}$, of ALL players.
2. BC provided 74/80, or 92.5%, of ALL WEST players.
3. ON provided 18/25, or 72%, of ALL EAST players.
4. Greater Vancouver provided 60/80, or 75%, or $\frac{3}{4}$, of ALL WEST players.
